
shrimp-like crustacean.


She also knew that these gigantic whales required about 4000 kgs of krill per day!

Unfortunately, the krill feed




Melting Iceberg

Marine debris, or trash in the ocean, is now a major threat to whales. Ship strikes are a major cause of whale fatalities. To avoid excessive shipping, you can do your best to buy local. Additionally, reducing your carbon dioxide (CO_2) emissions is important as they lead to ocean acidification and rising sea temperatures, which can impact the smallest organisms of the ocean to the largest. You can use bikes, buses, skateboards, or your feet to reduce your carbon footprint.
