Tara was feeling peckish and decided to snack on a glass of turmeric milk and an apple. The cold weather made her hungrier than usual. This reminded her of the cute, furry sea otters, members of the weasel family. These creatures spend most of their days diving for food and eating. Since they live in the chilly Pacific and lack a blubber layer to protect them from the cold, they have the thickest fur of any animal. They eat about 25 to 35 percent of their body weight each day to burn the calories needed for metabolism and body heat.

Tara dreamed of going to the coast of California to see these wonderful creatures, but she knew that sea otters were being hunted for their fur and slowly wiped out. That would be sad, she thought. However, she remembered reading in a magazine that sea urchins were the favorite food of sea otters, and that sea urchins themselves

ate kelp, a large, brown algae that grew in cool, shallow waters close to the shore. Tara found sea otters fascinating because they used a tool - a stone - to crack open the shell of their prey, the sea urchin. They stored the stone in a loose page.

realized it would be a good idea to watch them from a distance.

Tara thought about the impact of sea otters on the ecosystem. If sea otters were wiped out, there would be lots of sea urchins eating up all the kelp, which meant that all marine animals that relied on kelp for food and shelter would also be wiped out. Kelp forest was like a rainforest under the coastal sea, absorbing up to 0.18 kilograms per square meter of carbon from the atmosphere.

Tara understood that the importance of the sea otter could not be underestimated. They needed to be preserved and protected from hunting and oil spills. Oil in coastal waters tended to stick to the furry coats of the sea otter, which destroyed the insulating property of their fur. This caused the otters to die from exposure to cold

- 6. What is the purpose of this stone for otters?


Take turns to make more questions like these above for each other and answer them.
