

The Gopher Frog

The scent of smoke reminded Tara of forest fires and the destruction they can cause. However, she also remembered reading somewhere that forest fires can be beneficial for certain types of habitats, such as the pine grasslands that are home to gopher frogs and tortoises. periodically, it
helps maintain the habitat by
keeping the canopy clear and
getting rid of vegetation in
the ponds, which supports
large populations of
burrowing animals like the
gopher frog. Tara likened this
process to getting rid of
garbage by burning it.

Curious to learn more about

gopher frogs, Tara decided to do some research. She discovered that this tiny, three-inch long frog is one of the 100 most endangered species on the planet and is only found in pine grasslands in Mississippi. The gopher frog is known for

its loud, rumbling call, which is similar to a human snore. It also secretes poison to escape predators and can lift its front legs to cover its eyes. Gopher frogs hide from the sun for most of their lives and find shelter in burned-out tree stumps resulting from natural fires.

Unfortunately, climate change and development are threatening the gopher frog's habitat.
Unpredictable rain and drought patterns caused by climate change are changing the habitat, making it unsuitable for gopher frogs. The ponds where they breed are



drying up, and development like roads and the timber industry are destroying

their habitat even further.
As of 2015, only around
135 dusky gopher frogs
were estimated to remain in
the wild, mostly at a single
pond in Mississippi.

Tara finished reading about the gopher frog with a sigh.



She had already noticed that there were hardly any frogs in her area, and she remembered her mother telling her that when she was a child, frogs would croak to indicate rain. Tara realized that the disappearance of frogs was not just an ecological tragedy but also a sign of a changing climate.
