




In faraway Cambodia, Bun Saluth is successfully protecting thousands of hectares of evergreen forest. Saluth leads a Buddhist environmental movement, and his efforts have earned him a nickname for the protected forest - Monks Community Forest. Saluth grew up as the son of a farmer, which explains his love for nature. This love was further strengthened when he left home to become a Buddhist monk. His search for peace led him to Thailand, where he met the "ecology monks," a subset of Buddhism. According to Saluth, Buddhism plays a vital role in conserving nature, as Lord Buddha used trees and caves as his lodging to obtain enlightenment. In this way, he taught people to love nature and animals. After spending five years in Thailand and learning conservation tactics from the ecology monks, Saluth returned home. He began working with the villagers living in the forest land, and though they were initially hostile, his efforts paid off. Saluth explained to the locals that the loss of the forest had made the temperature increase and rain unpredictable, which led to increased

diseases and an increased release of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. He set up a local forest community that worked to prevent illegal logging. Under his guidance, farmers started sustainable farming of mushrooms, bamboo, tree resins, and wild potatoes.

For his work, Saluth was awarded the Equator Prize by the United Nations Development Programme in 2010. Tara felt relieved that there were people looking after our forests. She got up to do her bit to help the environment by disposing of plastic waste.
